- 1. You have recently assisted in merging Burkina Faso, Cote D'Ivoire, Ghana and Togo into a Federation called Facoghanato, with the capital in Accra. In this new Federal republic, each of the old countries became constituent states. In the constitution you helped in fashioning for Facoghanato, it is clearly provided that whatever legislative powers that are not contained in the Exclusive and the Concurrent Legislative Lists will fall under the residual powers of the states. Burkina Faso state has a thriving Tourism and Hotel Industry with a recently enacted state law for the regulation of the said industry. Tourism and Hotel Industry is not listed in any of the Exclusive and the Concurrent Legislative Lists contained in the Constitution of Facoghanato. The Federal Government of Facoghanato has sent a bill to the Federal Parliament of the new republic. The essence of the proposed bill is that the federal government will take-over the regulation of tourism and hotel industry. The Attorney-General Burkina Faso state has come to consult you for legal advice. Write out your opinion.
